

Anne Couvent's Ascending Lineage to Amalric, King of Jerusalem

Anne Couvent came to New France from Picardy with her husband Philippe Amiot / Hameau and two sons, Jean and Mathieu, in 1636. A third child, Charles, was born in New France. In addition, her nephew, Toussaint Ledran, the son of Louis Ledran and Charlotte Couvent, also settled in New France. Many Canadians and Americans descend from one of the Couvent sisters and thus from royalty.

Amalric, of the house of Anjou, was the ruler of the Crusader kingdom of Jerusalem and reigned from 1163 to 1174. His second wife, Maria Comnena, was the great-grandniece of Manuel I Comnenus, the emperor of Byzantium.

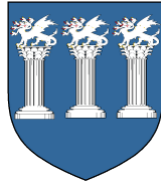

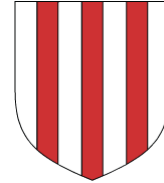

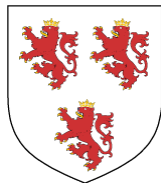

Christophe de **Barbançon**, seigneur of Canny-sur-Matz, and Jeanne de **Saarbrücken**, married before 1463, he was the son of:



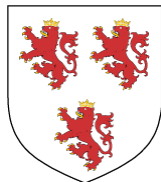

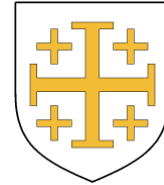

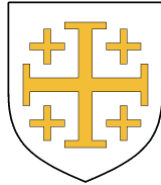
